In honor of the shepherds, perform some act of kindness for the poor in your community for Christmas.

Say "no" for Advent

Instead of taking on extra activities during the Christmas season, try saying "no" more often. Don't work overtime, don't attend another party, even say "no" to additional volunteer activities. Use the time you said "no" to the world to say "yes" to preparing for the Lord.

Pray the wait

Pray randomly this Advent while you wait. Pray while waiting for your table at a restaurant, while your toast is cooking, at the stop light, on the way to work. Keep your prayer simple and start with praise.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).



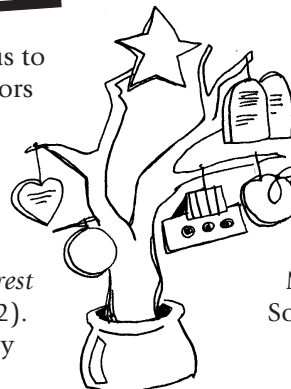
Why Do Catholics Do That?

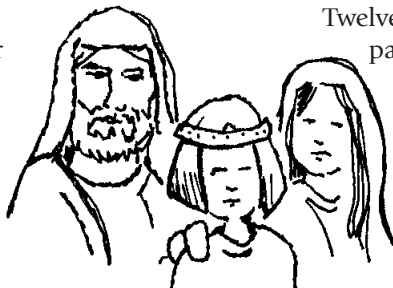

Luke 2:41-52, Families aren't always holy

Perhaps there is no time during the year when our families can be at their worst than at Christmas time. The holiday brings together families and their baggage in ways that don't always bring out the best in us.

Perhaps it helps to remember that the Holy Family was a real family just like ours. They had tough times, too. There was talk of divorce when Joseph found out Mary was pregnant. Then they had trouble finding a place for Mary to give



birth. Immediately afterwards, the family fled to a strange land because a mad man wanted Jesus killed.

Twelve years later, he and his parents were separated for three days when Jesus stayed behind at the temple.

Families have good times and bad, and it takes every member working together to

to suspend judgment of your family this year, and love them as a Holy Family, even if not everyone is loveable all the time.

Q & A Was St. Nicholas a real person?

St. Nicholas, the bishop of Myra, was born at the end of the third century in Asia Minor. The son of wealthy parents who died while he was a child, he selflessly shared his wealth with those in need.

One popular story concerning a man who had lost his fortune and was too poor to fill his family's bellies. He was considering selling his three daughters into slavery to pay off his debts. Nicholas heard of the man's situation and secretly threw a bag of gold into an open window in the house. When the man awoke the next morning, he thanked God for his good fortune. Twice more Nicholas helped the man in this way, and each time the man praised God – just as Nicholas intended.



St. Nicholas' feast day is December 6th. Children all over the world put their shoes out at night to find them filled with candy and small treats in the morning in remembrance of St. Nicholas' anonymous generosity.

Feasts & Celebrations

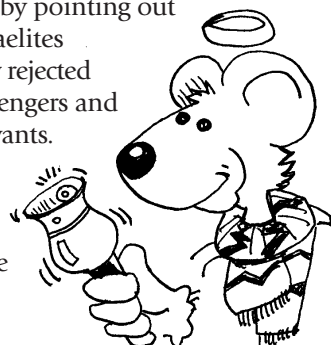
December is the month in which we anticipate the coming of Christ and begin the celebration of his birth. It has become a time to reaffirm our respect for life from conception to natural death.

Dec. 8 – Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This is the day we celebrate that Mary was conceived in St. Anne's womb without original sin.

December 7th – St. Ambrose (397). As bishop of Milan, St. Ambrose was an effective pastor and teacher, and was devoted to the care of the poor. He

vigorously guarded the Church against Arians, who denied Jesus' divinity.

December 26 – St. Stephen (first century). A deacon of the early Church, St. Stephen preached that God can be found everywhere, not just in one place like the temple. He angered the Jewish authorities by pointing out that the Israelites consistently rejected God's messengers and chosen servants. For that he was stoned to death and became the first martyr.



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
