Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time October 12, 2025 Month of the Holy Rosary



A foreign leper is cleansed and in thanksgiving returns to offer homage to the God of Israel. We hear this same story in both the First Reading and Gospel today.

There were many lepers in Israel in Elisha's time, but

only Naaman the Syrian trusted in God's Word and was cleansed. Today's Gospel likewise implies that most of the ten lepers healed by Jesus were Israelites—but only a foreigner, the Samaritan, returned.

In a dramatic way, we're being shown today how faith has been made the way to salvation, the road by which all nations will join themselves to the Lord, becoming His servants, gathered with the Israelites into one chosen people of God, the Church.

Today's Psalm also looks forward to the day when all peoples will see what Naaman sees—that there is no God in all the earth except the God of Israel.

We see this day arriving in today's Gospel. The Samaritan leper is the only person in the New Testament who personally thanks Jesus. The Greek word used to describe his "giving thanks" is the word we translate as "Eucharist."

And these lepers today reveal to us the inner dimensions of the Eucharist and sacramental life.

We, too have been healed by our faith in Jesus. As Naaman's flesh is made again like that of a little child, our souls have been cleansed of sin in the waters of Baptism. We experience this cleansing again and again in the Sacrament of Penance—as we repent our sins, beg and receive mercy from our Master, Jesus.

We return to glorify God in each Mass, to offer ourselves in sacrifice falling on our knees before our Lord, giving thanks for our salvation.

In this Eucharist, we remember "Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David," Israel's covenant king. And we pray, as Paul does in today's Epistle, to persevere in this faith—that we too may live and reign with Him in eternal glory.

Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading I: 2 Kings 5:14-17 Thank God for the good things he does for you.

- The story from the Second Book of Kings is part of the Elijah-Elisha cycle of prophetic legends.
- When Naaman came to Elisha to request a cure, Elisha sent him to wash seven times in the Jordan River.
- Naaman's physical cure becomes the basis of faith in the God of Israel.

Reading I: 2 Timothy 2:8-13 There is no chaining the word of God!

- Today's reading from the Second Letter of Paul to Timothy continues the series of exhortations for ministers of the gospel.
- Those who suffer hardships with Christ and for him, who die and are faithful to the end with him, will live with Christ in the kingdom.
- This letter stresses the rewards and punishments for service and failure.

Gospel: Luke 17:11-19 Be grateful.

- The Gospel reading today tells the story of a healing.
- The ingratitude of the other lepers is a surprising account, but the fact that the one grateful returnee was a Samaritan was possibly more shocking at the time.
- The Samaritan is not only healed, he is also saved through wholeness and a proper relationship to God.

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"Plunged" And "Cleansed" Clear parallels exist between the characters in today's scripture stories and our own lives as Christians. Just as Naaman was "plunged into the Jordan" (2 Kings 5:14) we were plunged—the word "baptize" is derived from a root word meaning "plunge"—into the waters of baptism. Just as Naaman became "like . . . a little child" (2 Kings 5:14), in baptism we were born into new life as children of God. Just as the lepers in the Gospel turned to Jesus for mercy and "were cleansed" and "healed" (Luke 17:14, 15), we, too, were washed clean and healed of our sins in baptism. Finally, like both Naaman and the Samaritan leper, most of us have never been members of the Jewish people. Yet we are among those of whom the Letter to Timothy speaks: In baptism we were "chosen, so that [we] too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, together with eternal glory" (2 Timothy 2:10).
