God's ways of seeing are not our ways, we hear in today's First Reading. Jesus illustrates this in the Gospel as the blind man comes to see and the Pharisees are made blind.

The blind man stands for all humanity. "Born totally in sin," he is made a new creation by the saving power of Christ.

As God fashioned the first man from the clay of the earth, Jesus gives the blind man new life by anointing his eyes with clay. As God breathed the spirit of life into the first man, the blind man is not healed until he washes in the waters of Siloam, a name that means "Sent."

Jesus is the One "sent" by the Father to do the Father's will. He is the new source of life-giving water: the Holy Spirit who rushes upon us in Baptism.

This is the Spirit that rushes upon God's chosen king David in today's First Reading. A shepherd like Moses before him, David is also a sign pointing to the good shepherd and king to come—Jesus.

The Lord is our shepherd, as we sing in today's Psalm. By His death and Resurrection, He has made a path for us through the dark valley of sin and death, leading us to the verdant pastures of the kingdom of life, the Church.

In the restful waters of Baptism He has refreshed our souls. He has anointed our heads with the oil of Confirmation and spread the Eucharistic table before us, filling our cups to overflowing. With the once-blind man we enter His house to give God the praise, to renew our vow: "I do believe, Lord."

"The Lord looks into the heart," we hear today. Let Him find us, as Paul advises in today's Epistle, living as "children of light," trying always to learn what is pleasing to our Father.

Sunday Readings and Backgrounds Fourth Sunday of Lent

Reading I : 1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a David is anointed king of Israel.

- Saul the first king anointed by Samuel is rejected by God for disobedience.
- God sends Samuel to Bethlehem to anoint Saul’s successor. Samuel anoints David.
- The first reading is a story of seeing. God sees David as no one else sees him.

Reading II : Ephesians 5:8-14 You are people of the light.

- The passage from Ephesians expands on the division between the sightless and the seeing.
- Those who believe in Jesus are children of light.
- With Christ they have been raised from the darkness of death and live in the light of Christ.

Gospel : John 9:1-41 Jesus gives us sight.

- At the start of today’s Gospel story of the man born blind, the disciples believe that sin is the cause of the man’s blindness. When Jesus gives the blind man sight, both the disciples and the blind man move from darkness into light.
- The Pharisees accuse Jesus of sin because he healed the blind man on the Sabbath. The man with new sight however sees more clearly, he calls Jesus a prophet.
- The Pharisees refuse to believe; they are truly blind. <https://lifelongcatechesis.osv.com/>

Living As Children Of The Light After the man born blind was healed, he could have done any number of things. He could have used his newly-received sight for good or for ill, or he could have just said “thanks” and gone on his way. When we receive the light of Christ in baptism, as well as God’s anointing Spirit (as does David in today’s first reading), we join the community of faith that professes Jesus Christ as the Light from Light, true God from true God. We are part of the Body of Christ—the church—who glorify God and worship Christ, as does the man born blind today. But we are called upon to do more. Ephesians tells us that we, who were blind but now see, are called to live, day by day, as children of that light. We don’t just say “thanks” for our baptism. Rather, our vocation is to live out that thanks by doing deeds of light, by spreading the gospel of the joy, justice, beauty, and peace we find in Jesus. This is one of the intentions of our Lenten disciplines, to help us leave behind the deeds of darkness and to live out the light of the Good News. *Copyright © 2007, World Library Publications.
