Easter's empty tomb is a call to conversion. By this tomb, we should know for certain that God has made Jesus both Lord and Messiah, as Peter preaches in

today's First Reading.

He is the "Lord," the divine Son that David foresaw at God's right hand. And He is the Messiah that God had promised to shepherd the scattered flock of the house of Israel.

As we hear in today's Gospel, Jesus is that Good Shepherd, sent to a people who were like sheep without a shepherd. He calls not only to the children of Israel but to all those far off from Him—to whomever the Lord wishes to hear His voice.

The call of the Good Shepherd leads to the restful waters of Baptism, to the anointing oil of Confirmation, and to the table and overflowing cup of the Eucharist, as we sing in today's Psalm.

Again on this Sunday in Easter, we hear His voice calling us His own. He should awaken in us the response of those who heard Peter's preaching. "What are we to do?" they cried.

We have been baptized. But each of us goes astray like sheep, as we hear in today's Epistle. We still need daily to repent, to seek forgiveness of our sins, to separate ourselves further from this corrupt generation.

We are called to follow in the footsteps of the Shepherd of our souls. By His suffering He bore our sins in His body to free us from sin. But His suffering is also an example for us. From Him we should learn patience in our afflictions, to hand ourselves over to the will of God.

Jesus has gone ahead, has driven us through the dark valley of evil and death. His Cross has become the narrow gate through which we must pass to reach His empty tomb—the verdant pastures of life abundant.

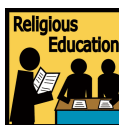

Sunday Readings and Backgrounds Third Sunday of Easter

Reading I : Acts 2:14a, 36-41 You must reform and be baptized.

- In today's first reading, Peter poses some important questions about the meaning of life to the Jews assembled in Jerusalem.
- From Peter's perspective, those who had yet to recognize that "Jesus was both Lord and Christ" were a corrupt generation.
- In asking the Jews to believe that Jesus was "Lord and Christ," Peter was really saying that Jesus is God and Messiah.

Reading II : 1 Peter 2:20b-25 By his wounds you were healed.

- The reference to Isaiah's Suffering Servant in today's first reading, points to the example of Christ.
- Jesus Christ was truly innocent and when he suffered, he did not oppose with force.
- This message was important for the Christians who were suffering persecution at the time for living as followers of Jesus.

Gospel : John 10:1-10 I am the gate.

- The Gospel today portrays Jesus as the gateway through which we enter the Church.
- Besides drawing on a common image from everyday life at the time of Jesus, today's Gospel evokes several passages from the Hebrew Scriptures.
- In Ezekiel 34, the prophet reveals that God is the shepherd of the sheep. The author of today's Gospel understands that God has become the shepherd in Jesus. <https://lifelongcatechesis.osv.com/>

That's Not Me I will never forget my very first day of school. In those days, class sizes in Catholic grammar schools were quite large; my first grade class had fifty-two students. Our teacher made large name tags for each of us to wear that first day. Unfortunately, my name tag read "Edward Gallagher." This is not my name. When I saw this, I tried to protest, "Sister, that's not my . . ." She immediately responded, "Now, Edward, there will be no talking back to Sister." I tried again, "But Sister . . ." Her hands more than full with fifty-two of us, there apparently just wasn't time for this conversation. So, I went through my first day of school named someone I was not. I will never forget my mother's face as she stood on the front porch ready to welcome her first-born son home from his first day of school. She took one look at "Edward Gallagher," frowned, and immediately went to the phone to straighten things out with the school.

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Called By Name This early life experience taught me much about the value and importance of my name. In today's Gospel we hear the Lord Jesus tell his followers that sheep learn to recognize the voice of the shepherd. They will not follow a stranger's voice. In the Rite of Baptism, the very first question put to the parents is, "What name do you give your child?" And just before the words "I baptize you . . ." the priest or deacon calls the one to be baptized by name. In a sense, we learn to hear our name called by God from the moment of our rebirth in the waters of baptism. This is the root of all vocational calls, whether to marriage, holy orders, or the consecrated life. On a day when we remember that Jesus is our caring shepherd, let us listen once again to the Lord calling us each by name into loving service. *Copyright © 2007, World Library Publications.
