We often begin Mass with the prayer from today's Epistle: The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, to Jerusalem and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with

all of you." We praise the God who has revealed Himself as a Trinity, a communion of persons.

Communion with the Trinity is the goal of our worship—and the purpose of the salvation history that begins in the Bible and continues in the Eucharist and sacraments of the Church.

We see the beginnings of God's self-revelation in today's First Reading, as He passes before Moses and cries out His holy name.

Israel had sinned in worshipping the golden calf (see Exodus 32). But God does not condemn them to perish. Instead He proclaims His mercy and faithfulness to His covenant.

God loved Israel as His firstborn son among the nations (see Exodus 4:22). Through Israel—heirs of His covenant with Abraham—God planned to reveal Himself as the Father of all nations (see Genesis 22:18).

The memory of God's covenant testing of Abraham—and Abraham's faithful obedience—lies behind today's Gospel.

In commanding Abraham to offer his only beloved son (see Genesis 22:2, 12, 16), God was preparing us for the fullest possible revelation of His love for the world.

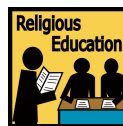
As Abraham was willing to offer Isaac, God did not spare His own Son but handed Him over for us all (see Romans 8:32).

In this, He revealed what was only disclosed partially to Moses—that His kindness continues for a thousand generations, that He forgives our sin and takes us back as His very own people (see Deuteronomy 4:20; 9:29).

Jesus humbled Himself to die in obedience to God's will. And for this, the Spirit of God raised Him from the dead (see Romans 8:11) and gave Him a name above every name (see Philippians 2:8–10).

This is the name we glorify in today's Responsorial: the name of our Lord, the God who is Love (see 1 John 4, 8, 16).

~Sunday Readings and Gospel~

Reading I : Exodus 34:4-6, 8-9 A merciful and gracious God.

- The event described in today’s reading from Exodus happened just after Israel broke the covenant by making an image of God as the golden calf.
- As the reading opens, God’s renewal of the broken covenant is symbolized by new stone tablets containing the Law.
- Then God stood before Moses and pronounced the Divine name. A name that means not only that God is but also that God is actively present.

Reading II : 2 Corinthians 13:11-13 Brothers and sisters, mend your ways.

- The second reading concludes Paul’s Second Letter to the Corinthians.
- It is an exhortation on the virtues of the Christian life: conversion, mutual encouragement, harmony, and peace.
- These virtues live in the Christian community through the gift of God’s presence.

Gospel : John 3:16-18 God so loved the world that he gave his only Son.

- Today’s Gospel passage tells us how deep God’s love is.
 - The statement about God’s love was inserted into the middle of Jesus’ conversation with Nicodemus concerning the new birth that leads to eternal life.
 - According to John’s Gospel, belief in Jesus is salvation. <https://lifelongcatechesis.osv.com/>
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~Questions of the Week~

Theme: The mystery of the Trinity - Father, Son, Holy Spirit.

Question for Children: When people love each other, how do they treat each other?

Question for Youth: The Trinity is celebrated today. How would you describe your relationship with God the Father? With Jesus? With the Spirit?

Question for Adults: If you were to encourage the members of your own parish to live as a “community of love,” which is how we define the Trinity, how would you advise them to live? Use St. Paul’s list of exhortations as your starting point.

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Mystery Lived! While we can never fully understand the mystery of God, we do receive clues to the nature of God through our *experiences* of God moving in our lives. And those experiences reveal to us that what the scriptures say is true. Little by little we realize with awe that God is indeed the Lord of the universe, creating and ordering all that is good. We recognize with humble gratitude the ways in which Christ’s immense love has saved and brought us to life. Finally, we experience with joy the Holy Spirit alive in the community of believers, filling us with a love and peace that could only come from God. The mystery of the Trinity is meant to be experienced, believed, and lived. And we ourselves are called to be living clues that reveal to others the mysterious love of the Most Holy Trinity. Mystery Solved? The scriptures for this feast give us important clues to help us grasp, if not solve, the mystery of God. In the reading from Exodus God’s name is revealed to Moses. God is “the Lord, a merciful and gracious God, slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity” (Exodus 34:6). Thus, unimaginable as it may be, the Lord of the whole universe cares intimately for humanity and treats us always with merciful love. In fact, the Gospel tells us that God “so loved the world that he gave his only Son” that we “might have eternal life” (John 3:16). And that is not the end of God’s loving-kindness. The reading from Second Corinthians reminds us that “the God of love and peace” (2 Corinthians 13:11) is in our midst when we live in love and peace. God shares divine life with us by pouring out the Holy Spirit of grace, love, and holiness into the community of those who believe. *Copyright © 2007, World Library Publications.
