The words God speaks to Israel in today's First Reading are intended for us as well.

The Church is the fulfillment of God's covenant promises to Israel—a kingdom of priests and a holy nation.

In the Church, we have been gathered as the new "Israel of God". He has made us His own people, the flock He tends, as we sing in today's Psalm.

Moses was Israel's first shepherd. With the Promised Land in view, he prayed that God would raise up a successor so that God's people would not be left as sheep without a shepherd.

These same words are used in today's Gospel to describe Jesus' pity for the crowds, who are "troubled and abandoned, like sheep without a shepherd."

Israel's shepherds—the Pharisees and scribes—had abandoned and misled the people through their hypocrisy and spiritual blindness.

But God had long before promised that He Himself would come and save His sheep—searching over the whole earth where they had been scattered "for lack of a shepherd".

Jesus is the new Moses and new David promised by the prophets, a divine shepherd-king sent to restore God's priestly kingdom.

As Moses commissioned Joshua as his successor, so we see Jesus today giving the Twelve His powers and authority. In God's plan, they are to seek out the lost sheep of Israel first and then bring all nations into the fold.

Together we have been saved and reconciled to God, as we hear in today's Epistle. As He delivered Israel, He has also made us a kingdom of priests in the Church.

So we come in this Mass to serve Him with gladness, to praise His kindness, which endures forever.

~Sunday Readings and Gospel~

Reading I : 2 Samuel 12:7-10, 13 The repentant David is forgiven.

- The reading from 2 Samuel continues the story of David, Bathsheba, and Uriah the Hittite.
- Nathan condemns David for conspiring to kill a man in order to take his wife.
- Forgiveness is extended to a repentant David.

Reading II : Galatians 2:16, 19-21 A person is not right with God by works of the Law but through faith in Jesus Christ.

- The question of how the observance of the law relates to faith in Christ is addressed in Paul's letter to the Galatians.
- Paul stresses that strict observance of Jewish religious law alone is not the only way to right relationship with God.
- When we place our trust in the law alone, we fail to put our trust in Christ.

Gospel : Luke 7:36-8:3 She stood at his feet weeping and began to bathe his feet with her tears.

- In Luke's Gospel there are many stories about women.
 - Some biblical scholars suggest that Luke's special interest in women shows his concern for the marginalized and the outcast.
 - In today's passage, Simon the Pharisee is skeptical of Jesus' compassionate response to the sinful woman's anointing of him. <https://lifelongcatechesis.osv.com/>

Theme: Love rather than judge.

Question for Children: This week, how can you welcome someone at school or in your neighborhood who is feeling left out?

Labor Shortage Jesus explained two thousand years ago what we know to be true—that “the harvest is abundant but the laborers are few” (Matthew 9:37). We are always searching for more laborers for the harvest of the Master. Among all the baptized, priests and others who have chosen a religious life have given over their entire lives to be laborers in God's vineyard. They have answered God's call in a unique way to work the harvest and to proclaim by word and action—like Peter, Andrew, and the rest of the Twelve—that the kingdom of heaven is indeed at hand. We know that God will not leave us as “sheep without a shepherd” (Matthew 9:36), and so we trust that our prayers and efforts will yield the shepherds that God desires for us. *Copyright © 2007, World Library Publications. Labor Supply Just as the people of Israel were a nation of priests and a holy people, so are we all who bear the name of Christ. Jesus died for all of us. This alone justifies us and makes us holy to the point of salvation. That's how Paul sees it anyway. And in thinking about it, isn't every man, woman, and child who lives out the gospel message a priest in his or her own right, reconciled to the Father by Jesus? After all, at our baptism, each of us is received into “the royal priesthood of the baptized.” Here the sheep image breaks down a little, for each of us can be shepherd as well as sheep. Each of us is called to be a shepherd in some way, if only for one other person.

Our Lord was moved at the sight of the crowds aching for God's touch. Well, the crowds are still forming, so let us all join together, priests, religious, and all the baptized, in the work that must be done, for we are all called to bring Christ to the world. The nineteenth-century American orator and agnostic Robert Green Ingersoll said that love is the only priest. If this is true, then let us bring all the love we have to our neighbors, giving without cost.
