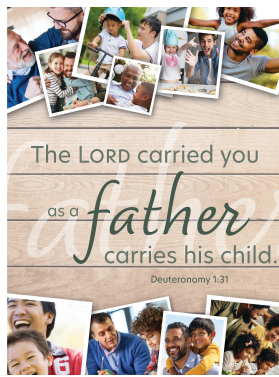

Our commitment to Christ will be put to the test. We will hear whispered warnings and denunciations, as Jeremiah does in today's First Reading. Even so-called

friends will try to trap and trip us up.

For His sake we will bear insults and be made outcasts—even in our own homes, we hear in today's Psalm.

As Jeremiah tells us, we must expect that God will challenge our faith in Him, and probe our minds and hearts, to test the depths of our love.

“Do not be afraid,” Jesus assures us three times in today's Gospel.

Though He may permit us to suffer for our faith, our Father will never forget or abandon us. As Jesus assures us today, everything unfolds in His providence, under His watchful gaze—even the falling of the tiniest sparrow to the ground. Each one of us is precious to Him.

Steadfast in this faith, we must resist the tactics of Satan. He is the enemy who seeks the ruin of our soul in Gehenna, or hell.

We are to seek God, as the Psalmist says. Zeal for the Lord's house, for the heavenly kingdom of the Father, should consume us, as it consumed Jesus. As Jesus bore the insults of those who blasphemed God, so should we.

By the gracious gift of Himself, Jesus bore the transgressions of the world, Paul tells us in today's Epistle. In rising from the dead, He has shown us that God rescues the life of the poor, that He does not spurn His own when they are in distress. In His great mercy, He will turn toward us, as well. He will deliver us from the power of the wicked.

That is why we proclaim His name from the housetops, as Jesus tells us. That is why we sing praise and offer thanksgiving in every Eucharist. We are confident in Jesus' promise—that we who declare our faith in Him before others will be remembered before our heavenly Father.

~Sunday Readings and Gospel~

Reading I : Jeremiah 20:10-13 He has delivered the soul of the needy from the hands of evil men.

- Today's passage comes from the middle of Jeremiah's prayer and it is the most graphic description of this prophet's struggle.
- Jeremiah complains bitterly to God about the cost of his prophetic call.
- Like most biblical laments, Jeremiah's complaint is interwoven with expressions of trust in God.

Reading II : Romans 5:12-15 God's gift to us is nothing like our sin against him.

- In the Letter to the Romans, Paul compares Adam, the first human, to Jesus, the firstborn of the new creation.
- Death is the result of sin; sin separates us from God who is the source of life.
- Jesus was completely obedient to God, and he therefore became the perfect channel of life for all humans.

Gospel : Matthew 10:26-33 Do not fear those who can kill the body.

- Today's passage from Matthew's Gospel is part of the missionary discourse that follows the sending out of the Twelve.
- Jesus reminds the disciples of the great and powerful care of the Father.
- Using the typical argument of the lesser to the greater, Jesus stresses that not even a sparrow dies without God's consent.

~Questions of the Week~

Theme: There is nothing to fear if we stay close to Jesus.

Question for Children: Jesus tells us not to be afraid. Name a time when you were afraid and Jesus helped you.

Question for Youth: Jesus tells us that he will remember us to his Father if we proclaim him to others. How easy is it for you to talk about your faith with your friends? How about your family or people you don't know very well?

Question for Adults: What is your responsibility to Jesus? How and when will you carry out that responsibility?

Be Not Afraid In the course of this short selection from Matthew's Gospel Jesus tells the Twelve three times not to be afraid. Both the disciples and Jesus will soon encounter suffering and death. Jesus reminds them, and us, of our Father's eternally powerful love that will not abandon us in the tough times. That is the grace that "overflow[ed] for the many," in "the gracious gift of the one man Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:15).

This message of hope is not meant to be kept to ourselves. Like the apostle Paul, we are to communicate that good news to all who may be experiencing tough times—through our actions as well as our words. Jesus proved the truth of his words by his saving death on the cross. What about us? When we calm others' fears, telling them not to be afraid, that everything will work out in the end, are those just empty words? Or do we follow up with actions that prove our words to be true? Tough Times For a lot of folks these are tough times. Some families are unable to afford health care or housing. Some people have lost high-paying jobs and are out of work for the first time in their lives. Others are caught in a whirlwind of ever-increasing activity, addiction, or abuse that dominates their lives. People of color still face oppression. Many seniors suffer from loneliness and poverty. Around the globe people are suffering from great pain, disease, malnutrition, and war. Even so, the scriptures for this Sunday give cause for hope for all who are going through tough times. In the midst of his suffering, Jeremiah finds hope in his knowledge that the Lord "rescued the life of the poor / from the power of the wicked!" (Jeremiah 20:13). Likewise the psalmist can endure persecutions because he knows "the Lord hears the poor" (Psalm 69:34).
