The liturgy this week continues to instruct us in the elements of discipleship. We're told that even the most humble among us have a share in the mission Christ gives

to His Church.

We're not all called to the ministry of the Apostles or to be prophets like Elisha in today's First Reading. But each of us is called to a holy life.

At Baptism, our lives were joined forever to the Cross of Christ, as Paul tells us in today's Epistle. Baptized into His death, we're to renounce sin and live for God in Christ Jesus.

We are to follow Him, each of us taking up our personal cross, as Jesus says in today's Gospel. That doesn't mean we will all be asked to suffer a martyr's death. But each of us is called to self-denial, to the offering of our lives in service of God's plan.

Jesus must be elevated to first place in our lives—above even our closest bonds of kinship and love. By Baptism, we've been made part of a new family: the kingdom of God, the Church. We are to proclaim that kingdom with our lives, bringing our fathers, our mothers, and all men and women to live as little ones under the fatherhood of God and the kingship of the Holy One.

We do this by opening our hearts and homes to the service of the Lord, following the Shunnamite woman's example in today's First Reading. As Jesus tells us, we're to receive others—not only prophets but also little children, the poor, and the imprisoned—as we receive Christ Himself.

As we sing in today's Psalm, we are to testify to His favors and kindness in our lives.

We're to hold fast to the promise—that if we have died with Christ, we shall also live, that if we lose our lives for His sake, we shall find our reward and walk forever in His countenance.

~Sunday Readings and Gospel~

Reading I : 2 Kings 4:8-11, 14-16a Elisha is a holy man of God, let him remain.

- A Shunemite woman recognizes Elisha as a holy man of God and she urged him to dine with her.
- Elisha promises the Shunemite woman that she will give birth to a son as a reward for her generous hospitality.
- The Shunemite woman shows us how to receive both a prophet and the prophetic word, with openness and an eager welcome.

Reading II : Romans 6:3-4, 8-11 Buried with Christ in baptism, we shall walk in the newness of life.

- We who were baptized into Christ have been baptized into Christ's Death.
- We no longer need to fear death.
- Sin and death no longer hold any power over us. We are to live for God!

Gospel Matthew 10:37-42 Whoever does not take up his cross is not worthy of me. Whoever receives you, receives me.

- Jesus explains the demands of discipleship.
- Those who welcome disciples welcome Jesus himself. They will be rewarded.
- Disciples are also included among the "little ones." Those who welcome them will also be rewarded.

New Life Most parents will say that the arrival of their first child was the beginning of a new life for them. They will say that the life of parenting involves lots of sacrifices, but the rewards are worth far more than the cost. And there is no one they would rather sacrifice for than their darling "little one."

This week all three scripture readings illustrate the rewards that God offers to those who are born into the new life of Christ in baptism. Paul tells us that all who die to sin in baptism shall live with Christ "in newness of life" (Romans 6:4). In this new life, sacrifices are freely and joyfully chosen, and they bring eternal rewards. The story of Elisha and the soon-to-be-widowed woman exemplifies the rewards of freely given sacrifice. She meets Elisha's needs not out of self-interest, but because she recognizes that Elisha is holy. Her sacrifice is rewarded with new life in her womb, a son to care for her in her old age.

Jesus' words to us reinforce this message: "Whoever loses his life for my sake will find it . . . and whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones" (Matthew 10:39, 42) will be rewarded.
